## President's Notes by Mary Calvin

"Green was the silence, wet was the light, the month of June trembled like a butterfly." – Pablo Neruda

I got a phone call last week saying the second generation of Monarch caterpillars is eating all the milkweed we gave out in March. The good thing is that it puts out more leaves. Please plant more milkweed for the Monarchs. Other host plants to consider: Gulf Fritillaries use passionflower vine. Swallowtail butterflies use parsley, dill, fennel, golden alexander, and other members of the carrot family. Oak trees are the champion host plant as they support over 500 varieties of caterpillars, according to author Douglas Tallamy.

What fun it was to hear the interns' presentations! Terry Delker got us ready to garden with Chair Yoga. Diane Roberson-Hill showed Rabbit Ferns that have been in the family for three generations, Mickey Ezell spoke on native Azaleas, Lee Brady on air-layering Camellias and Karon Pennington on Angel Trumpets. Therapist Julie Cox researched the horticultural therapy certification, and Dolores Hammack discussed the native habitat certification program by South Alabama Land Trust (SALT). Liz Young spoke about composting, and Patty Rowland took on edible weeds. Keith Cardwell demonstrated making "soil blocks", and George Donchez took a light-hearted look at the relationship between steel and plants.

Each of the interns received a certificate for completing the class. We will welcome them formally at the July 12 Awards Luncheon.

The general meeting on June 14 will feature "The Water Cycle," a lesson from the Master Environmental Program by Liz Wojtaszek and Charlotte Roberts. The business meeting will include Treasurer Cassandra Rabren's report. As of the May 10 meeting it looked like the plant sale revenue was over \$46,000.00 with expenses over \$25,000.00. Note that we will no longer offer a hybrid meeting with a Zoom option.

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
## President's Notes by Mary Calvin (continued)

## Lamb Farm Tour by Mary Calvin

We had two beautiful days in April for our visits to Susan Palmer's 70 acre lamb farm in Bay Minette. Susan and her husband, Mike, started the flock in 2021 with eight ewes and one ram of the breed of hair sheep called Katahdin, which has straight shedding hair that does not need to be sheared. This year's ten pregnant ewes

produced 3 single births, 6 sets of twins, and one set of triplets. Bertie was the smallest of the triplets and the lamb we got to hold. The rams and ewes are kept in separate plots, munching on winter rye, oats, Bahia grass and clover.



Summerdale School Butterfly Garden by Elmer Vick



# June Birthdays



The meeting was called to order by President Mary Calvin at 10:00 a.m. 79 members were present including six attending by Zoom.

Mary welcomed all the members and interns. Lyn Webb, AMGA Secretary, was our special guest. Lyn is a member of both Chilton County and Calhoun County MGs, is a

board member for Calhoun County, and is Treasurer for Chilton County. She is visiting as many county chapters as possible to learn how all of us do things.

Tanys Waldron introduced our speaker, Wanda Martin, whose topic was "I Love Orchids". Wanda presented a fun and informative program. Here are some highlights from her presentation.

• There are 700 genera and 28,000 individual species of orchids. They are either terrestrial (earth growing) or epiphytic (grown on the surface of other plants or material as they absorb moisture and nutrients from the air).

- Wanda's focus today was on Moth Orchids. She taught us how to care for them, how to know when to repot them, why we have such trouble getting orchids to rebloom, and how to fertilize and water orchids.
- Keep orchids in bright, indirect, light and give them southern exposure to the sun. A grow light may also be used.
- Repot every 2 years or so. Trim dead roots and using a pencil, poke the rest of the roots back into the pot. Orchids like to be rootbound. Use sphagnum moss, bark, or a mixture of both as your potting medium.
- Water orchids in the morning when they feel dry, fertilize weekly when dormant and every two weeks in the flowering phase.
- Once the blooms of the orchid are past their prime, cut back to a node behind the blooms. Another bloom will appear on the tip of the stalk.

Her talk included good and useable information. Please don't miss the next opportunity to hear her presentation.

After a short break, the business meeting began.

March meeting minutes: Gina Blakeman made a motion to approve the minutes, Elmer Vick seconded, and the motion passed.



Treasurer's Report: Cassandra Rabren gave information about the Plant Sale. Income was \$46,651.65. Expenses to date are \$25,320.82 which includes plants, Port-O-Lets, U-Haul rental and gas, food, drinks and taxes. Daphne and Community College greenhouse expenses will be deducted. All are asked to turn in receipts as soon as possible. Money from the Fire Sale of leftover greenhouse plants and items from the Trash and Treasures held today are not yet included in the profits. Preliminary profit is \$21,330.83. We currently have \$67,580.61 in our Regions account. This includes \$31,270.70 from the closing of the Community Foundation account. The Community Funds will be moved to CDs soon. We have a total of \$78,835.99 in liabilities and assets. Cassandra reviewed the quarterly 2023 budget, giving updates on actual vs. budgeted numbers on many items. Questions were answered and everyone is looking forward to the final Plant Sale report next month.

Outreach: Eileen Huisman announced that Kid's Day will be held June 16, 2023. Fran Posey is the BCMG cocoordinator with Sarah Butterworth from ACES. Volunteers for this event are needed. Please let Eileen know if you can assist. The July Awards Luncheon will be on July 12, 2023 at the Foley Civic Center. Doors open at 10:30, there will be a short meeting at 11:00, and lunch will be served at 11:30. The menu includes Chicken Tetrazzini, summer squash, broccoli, and strawberry short cake. The cost is \$17.00 per person.

Intern Class: Anita O'Connor said that May 11, 2023 is the last official day of class. A luncheon will be held following the class presentations. All are welcome and are asked to bring a salad or a dessert. Eight interns will present in person and three by video. All the interns accomplished getting 25 volunteer hours by mid-April. Two interns will receive a bronze star for the completion of 100 volunteer hours. Three interns have their Help Line hours. Mentors haven't been comfortable assisting their interns at the Help Line and Anita plans for next year's

Approximately 12-15 children will be in each session and Wanda needs 3-4 MGs to assist at each one.

Lydia Chan asked that anyone having issues receiving BCMG emails contact her for assistance.

Tanys Waldron announced that Fran Posey will be married May 18, 2023 and all BCMGs are invited. Contact Tanys for information.
